Around the world, our Little Sisters family is embracing a fresh new look that brings unity to all our Homes and joy to our hearts. But even as our colors and logo change, what remains unshakably constant is the mission entrusted to us by God: to care for the elderly poor with compassion, dignity, and tender love. That mission is the same today as it was in 1839, when Saint Jeanne Jugan welcomed the first elderly woman into her humble home and into her heart.

For more than 185 years, in times of peace and in times of crisis, the Little Sisters of the Poor have walked alongside the forgotten and the fragile. Through wars, through plagues and pandemics, across oceans and generations, our Sisters have said "yes" to God's call. And every step of the way, He has provided. Not just through material gifts, but through people like you, who become part of this mission with your own "yes."

Our new logo, now shared by all our Homes across the globe, is not simply a symbol. It is a reflection of who we are. The house at its center is more than a roof, it is the beating heart of our action, where love is lived in the small, quiet moments of daily life. Within it are our Residents, our staff, our Sisters, and you; our helpers, companions, and family.

An outstretched hand reminds us of the support we offer and receive. Whether that hand belongs to a Sister, a volunteer, or a kindhearted donor, it reflects humility, presence, and accompaniment. The dove above is the Holy

Spirit, guiding this work and breathing life into the charism gifted to us through Saint Jeanne Jugan. The hand holding the cane gently honors the elderly themselves, whose wisdom, stories, and sacred dignity are at the center of everything we do.

And then there are the colors, which are warm shades of red-orange and golden yellow. These colors are soft and welcoming, much like the spirit of our Homes. They represent our joy, our hope, and the energy that fuels our work every day. They speak of hospitality, humanity, and deep goodwill for those the world too often forgets.

From France to the Philippines, from Africa to right here in Palatine, this mission continues through God's Divine Providence and most importantly, through you. Your love, your prayers, and your generosity are woven into every act of kindness that fills our halls. Your support brings an abundance of comfort for our Residents, making St. Joseph's their Home.

Our mission thrives because you choose to be part of it. You are the hands and heart of Christ in this Home. Together, in this Jubilee Year of Hope, we are not only preserving the mission, we are renewing it. We are rejoicing in it. We are building a future full of grace, rooted in love, and overflowing with hope.

A Life of Service: Fr. Edmond DesForges



When Father Edmond DesForges arrived at St. Joseph's Home earlier this year, it felt like more than a move, it felt like a homecoming. At 75 years old, this humble Franciscan priest has lived a life devoted entirely to God, serving in schools, parishes, missions, in formation and marriage encounter groups across

the country. Now, he finds himself beginning a new chapter of that journey, surrounded by friendship, prayer, and peace.

Fr. Edmond grew up in a tight-knit French Canadian neighborhood on the south side of Chicago, in a home deeply rooted in Catholic faith. From a young age, he found himself drawn to peace and reflection rather than conflict. Teachers often asked his parents, "Do you think Edmond might become a priest?" And though he felt the gentle pull toward religious life, he waited until his heart was sure.

Eventually, God led him to the Conventual Franciscans, where he embraced a life of simplicity, humility, and joyful service. He taught French and theology, ministered to countless couples, and led formation for the men entering the Franciscan order for many years. He always went where God needed him, even when it wasn't where he expected to be.

Now living among the Little Sisters of the Poor, Fr. Edmond says he sees the spirit of St. Francis in their daily care. "Their heart goes straight into the ministry," he says. "I feel deeply at home here."

In this season of new beginnings, Fr. Edmond continues to give, offering his prayers, presence, and wisdom. And in turn, he receives the same love and compassion he once gave so freely. "It's humbling," he says. "As Franciscans, we go where the Lord sends us." Fr. Edmond continues to trust in God's will.

CELEBRATING GRANDPARENTS DAY!

MOTHER MERCY'S MESSAGE




Dear Friends,
